Session # 6 Community-Building and Dialogue on Social Media: Examining Democracy in the 21st Century Presented by: Judith E. Rosenbaum

Focus Topic: General Audience

It's hard to imagine that twenty years ago, most people found out about world and personal events through the major news networks, by phone, or email. Since then, a great deal has changed, most notably, the rise of social media. Social media platforms such as Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, and TikTok are an indelible part of people's daily lives, providing users with hours of entertainment, including unsurpassed opportunities for individuals to connect and share information

Social media platforms have created fierce debates about their impact on democracy. On the one hand, social media have afforded people the opportunity to raise awareness about and create change regarding issues ignored by society. People whose voices are commonly not heard in the mainstream media, have, thanks to social media, been able to connect and participate in conversations from which they have historically been excluded. On the other hand, questions have been raised about how well-informed social media platforms leave the average citizen. Similarly, research has investigated whether the communities created through social media merely function as filter bubbles that encourage polarization, distrust, and in the worst cases, extremism. Industry developments and shifts in ownership have also raised concerns about the role social media play in democratic processes.

This keynote will discuss the various threats and opportunities posed by social media through an examination of the potential of social media to serve as a virtual public sphere. It will reflect on what a well-functioning democracy looks like in a world dominated by social media and consider how and when the often one-sided, inflammatory, and silly discussions on platforms like Facebook and TikTok can still be seen to make a meaningful contribution to American democracy. We will end by discussing what educators can do to ensure their students develop the critical skills and understanding to utilize social media in a constructive manner.
